


- 300ish Animal Management Students + foundation and schools.
- 12 hours a week teaching per section.
- On average 5 10 extra sessions per week from lecturer-based sessions.
 - Allocation sheet is used to book out a specific activity.






But...

That never stays the same

- Loads of ad lib groups
 - Commercial activity
- And people book on allocation one activity and then do handling as a "reward" at the end.





Handling for A PURPOSE

- Started noticing negative behaviours in the animals.
- Wanted a teaching point for students that are going into industry (we don't just pick up for fun).
- Handling for health checks/weights still okay but MUST be prebooked.
- Limited weights to once per month unless a health concern. Use of visual health checks.
- The birth of the handling rota.
- Species being handled MUST be listed when booking

Choice based handling

- We do still offer where absolutely necessary handling for the lessons. These MUST be pre booked and checked with the Technician.
- 'Fun Handling' is replaced by training for choice-based handling. Not suitable for all species.
 - Bell training for the tortoises.
 - Luring leopard geckos onto hands.







 Curriculum still has modules for handling in which all students must demonstrate proper handling.

• Communication vital- lecturers communicate with the Ectotherm technician about who is most suitable/tolerates handling better than others and then must book individuals.

- Lessons to be spaced out and different individuals from animal groups to be used so it doesn't all fall on one animal
- If an animal was handled, they MUST have a rest day after with no handling!

Any problems...

Generally, NO!!!

- Everyone has been understanding that we are trying to increase our welfare standards.
- We are not stopping any lecturers being able to deliver curriculum
- BIAZA accreditation to use as a teaching point.




Commercially

- We do reptile encounters and use them in our ZKFTD and Animal Academy
- Already moved all our mammal encounters to training or choice-based interactions and this will only become more stringent with the new SSZMP and BIAZA guidelines
- All encounters should be assessed using the BIAZA close contact assessment form which does make it tricky for animals like snakes that can't choose to be handled.
- Can use the template as a learning tool for lessons

Making Changes

- For ZKFTD and Animal Academy we now do enrichment.
- We do still hold snakes for Reptile Encounters but get the participants to fill in the handling form.
 - Working with students on choice-based handling especially tortoises bell training.
 - Big part of the new guidelines is assessing AFTER interactions, so we currently make notes but looking at incorporating 'fun' ethograms into the encounter.
